Coleman's Strategic Budget Planning/Initial Draft Budget for 24/25

- We will have \$+75,000 (net of expenses through end of school year) in our Reserves from Covid years that we have held onto for situations like this (ie- we knew this was coming and have been prepared!)
- Feedback from teachers and parents: Important to strike a balance between academics and enrichment for our students
- We have been working closely with Principal Peck and are combining efforts with PTO and Site funds to offset District Budget Cuts for 24/25
 - Ensuring that all of our students have access to additional services AND enrichment
- With Prop 28 (state funding for art/music teachers), it is very likely that we will not have to pay as much for art next year (more savings for us)
- We don't have to pay for PE!! We don't have to pay for Counseling position, it's remaining at Full time!
- Average Daily Attendance (ADA) funding and Site/District initiative for 2024/25 to reduce Absenteeism = more \$\$ for our Schools
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Just like the District, we have time to adjust our PTO budget, this is just a first draft at this time, but we wanted
to be transparent and get our community's feedback/answer questions as we continue to work through the
process. There is an immediate deadline from the District for us (site and PTO) to commit to funding for
Intervention position

24/25 Coleman Planned Budget Changes

- Reminder- we fundraise in arrears, i.e- our fundraising/revenue this year applies to next school year's expenses
 Projected revenue this year: \$230K
 - \$250K if we hit our Spring Tiger Fund Rush Goal of \$20k- Let's SPRING into Action!
- Currently, we have a full time (5 days a week) Intervention teacher that is fully funded by the District (23/24 year)
 - District is going to pay for 2.5 days for 24/25
 - We are proposing in conjunction with site funds to pay for the additional 2.5 days and maintain our full time Intervention teacher for 24/25. This would equate to approximately \$60K of the 24/25 budget
 - Minimum 4 days, Planning for 5 days
 - The PTO Exec Board, Teachers and Mr. Peck feel strongly that in addition to Enrichment, Intervention is a critical
 position for the success of all of our students and school now and in the future
- If needed, potential savings in expense areas such as:
 - Teacher Discretionary Funds (reduce, not eliminate)
 - Mr. Nettell (discontinue/bring back first)
 - Staff Appreciation Lunches (Grade level Reps will ask for \$ donations, in kind donations or provide pot-luck lunch)
 - Anne Rovetta (discontinue/bring back)
- Great News!! HeadsUp Foundation mini grant funding to supplement the areas we're reducing/discontinuing funding
- Great News!! We still plan to fund Music, Dance, STEM programs, Garden Program, Field Trips, Community events and activities, Library and Campus improvements, Grade/Classroom parties, etc.

DRAFT 2024/2025 PTO Budget/Spend:

Final budget will be approved during first PTO meeting in August 2024 but PTO Exec Board is proposing we commit PTO funds to support hiring a full-time Intervention Teacher, if we're going to do this, we need to make that commitment now.

Questions:

DJ – can we hear from Teachers and Alex on their thoughts on these changes to Enrichment funding and programs and next year's PTO funding and priorities?

Answer: Ms Sanchez and Ms Hakala were in attendance and shared their perspectives about.

Ms Sanchez: Keeping the Intervention Teacher is critical to help close the achievement gap. There is such a huge range of students at Coleman, closing that achievement gap really would help all students at Coleman because teachers could really be even more productive if the achievement gap among the students was not as broad. Myself and other teachers I have spoken with, are totally OK with a lower discretionary amount from the PTO. And, we can encourage more sharing of supplies and resources among staff (especially with newer teachers). At Coleman, we are really rich in supplies, but we are not as rich in people and we could really use more people resources.

Ms Hakala: Intervention is such a key piece to student achievement. It doesn't just benefit the students who go to intervention, raising the achievement of the entire class and school continues to have long term positive impacts even into middle school and high school which positively affects our entire community. As for potentially reducing Enrichment specials (ie: Mr Nettles, Ana Rivetta), several teachers (primarily in the lower grades) are actually feeling overbooked and not having enough uninterrupted minutes with students vs how many minutes we have scheduled with Specials. In the lower grades, instructional blocks need to be about an hour in order to be able to provide background information, active teaching, active lesson, progress monitoring and course correction, and closing, this is what it takes to provide a well thought out lesson. It's hard to find these big chunks of time to provide this quality teaching in the lower grades.

Alex Peck: Coleman is so special because we have all these opportunities to support the wholistic student. Students thrive when they have opportunities for enrichment (Art, PE, Music) and these add-on experiences (Garden/Environmental Science, STEM activities, Dave Nettles hands on social emotional learning). We're really lucky that we have this. Coleman made growth this year in our State testing, and we can continue to make growth. We had 6% growth in English Language Arts and 7% in Math this year. Having early intervention for our students we can increase the academic rigor for everyone. When we have students engaging in higher level language early on, it allows them later on to dive into deeper concepts. To Sasha's point, in our classrooms, we have this opportunity gap that is spread out a few grade levels, we can use intervention to home in on that and close the gap. We had 12-15 students who were in the red (2-3 grade levels behind in reading), we got all except 1 out of the red (they're in the yellow and green now). We're seeing this growth across those students who have received intervention. Let's continue to push our student's achievement to pre-Covid numbers. Let's keep the Fulltime Intervention and give our students what they need.

No further questions, comments, or concerns. <u>We will move forward with committing</u> <u>PTO funds to support a Fulltime Intervention Teacher.</u>

8. Coleman Book Fair Recap - Nicole/Anne (3 minutes)

Thank you to all the Volunteers who made Book Fair possible! Thank you to parents and families who shopped at our Book Fair.

Book Fair 2024 Recap

- Rewards-eligible revenue = \$10,691.80 (approximately \$900 less than last year)
- Earned \$2,399.22 cash back towards PTO fundraising (25% of our Book Fair revenue. Last year we earned 50% of our Book Fair revenue as Scholastic dollars)
- Granted over 150 Teacher Wishes (every classroom received their full wishlist!)
- Received over \$700 donated to Tiger Book Fund, Sponsored books for over 60 Coleman students! (and unfulfilled Teacher Wishlists with remaining donations)
- Approximately 1,000 books! Top sellers: Picture Books (233), Journals (151), Easy Readers (119), Middle Grade Fiction (108), Graphic-Novels (103), Chapter Books (72)





9. Principal's Report - Mr Peck (15 minutes)

ELPAC Testing this week – this is one of our indicators that Coleman is rated by. Keep in mind, on average, it takes 5 years for students to become English Language proficient. We want to see our students, as they are graduating out of Coleman, that they are being designated as English Language proficient.

Dave Nettle Part 2 (flying, screaming chicken) happening right now at school.

Attendance campaign to increase Average Daily Attendance – we will have a monthly celebration for the grade level that has the highest % attendance. For the month of March, TK won a Hot Dog celebration!

5th Grade Walker Creek (outdoor education) overnight field trip (with Sun Valley and a school from Petaluma) April 23 – 26. \$381 fee for each student, next year the cost will increase to \$400

TK Lottery last week. Enrollment was 36 students for Coleman which exceeded our capacity (20 students) at Coleman (after Construction project is complete, we'll have 2 TK classrooms at Coleman). 8 students with siblings attending Coleman were automatically placed at Coleman, the remaining 12 TK spots were randomly selected through the lottery. The remaining 16 students will be placed on a waitlist to get into TK at Coleman but will have a spot in TK at Short School.

Friday, May 2 is a minimum day, 11:50 AM release.
